### Saying goodbye to our Headteacher:

We are very sad to say that our Headteacher, Mr Dave Humphreys will be leaving the school at the end of this term.

Mr Humphreys started at Ysgol Bryn Elian as Deputy Headteacher in 2008 having previously taught at Ysgol Emrys ap Iwan, Abergele and also Blessed Edward Jones High School in Rhyl.

He was appointed to Headteacher 6 years ago and during this time led the school during what was to become a very trying and turbulent time for all schools as they navigated their way through a National Lockdown and the Corona Virus pandemic.

During the pandemic, Ysgol Bryn Elian, under the leadership of Mr Humphreys ensured that no stone was unturned in relation to looking after the education and welfare of all the learners and staff at the school. The hard work and dedication of all the staff and a fantastic relationship with parents and the community saw the school thrive even during these most turbulent times.

Mr Humphreys is passionate, not only about education, but deeply passionate about the welfare and wellbeing of learners and has made sure that the school's motto of 'Achievement for All' is something that chimes through the very fabric of Ysgol Bryn Elian.

To this end the school was awarded an Inclusion Quality Mark in 2020 and became a Centre of Excellence for its exceptional work in the field of Inclusion.

Mr Humphreys has contributed greatly to the school as both deputy and Headteacher.

Over the last 2 years we have seen the school environment improve dramatically with a new 3G pitch, a new Multi Use Games Area Pitch, an outside gym, a new Science lab, a refurbished teaching block and a new PE suite and wellness room with gym and a newly refurbished studio to name just a few.

Its safe to say that Mr Humphreys will be sorely missed at the school. He will still be working in education as a consultant working with Newly Qualified Teachers and schools in North Wales and as an assessor for the Inclusion Quality Mark.

We wish him all the very best in his semi-retirement and his new ventures.

As Mr Humphreys departs Ysgol Bryn Elian for pastures new, he leaves the school in the very capable hands of Mrs Hastings who will assume the role of Headteacher from September 1st 2023.

# 2 case studies published by Estyn!

In October, the school was visited as part of a Thematic Inspection on Developing pupils' English reading skills from 10-14 years of age. As a result, the school was asked to submit, two Case Studies as examples of excellent practice. One of these was focussed on disciplinary literacy and the other on transition in learning. Both case studies were published by Estyn on their website. The case studies can be seen below.

# Case study 1: Planning for the consistent development of disciplinary literacy, including reading

### Information about the school.

Ysgol Bryn Elian is an 11-18 comprehensive in Colwyn Bay, Conwy, with 976 pupils. In 2022, 24.7% of pupils had additional learning needs and the three-year average for pupils eligible for free school meals was 20.3%.

### Context and background to the practice

School leaders identified four key areas as a focus for improving provision to develop literacy skills across the curriculum: explicit language development, access to varied and challenging texts, improving learner accuracy and supporting extended writing.

### **Description of activity/strategy**

Using the revised Literacy Framework, all departments identified the literacy needs for their subject to enable learners to progress. Leaders provided opportunities for collaboration, professional learning and exemplification to support the development of consistency.

As part of explicit language development, teachers in every subject provide systematic vocabulary instruction to help pupils access and use academic language. Teachers prioritise the teaching of tier 2 and 3 vocabulary, which learners are unlikely to encounter in everyday speech.

To comprehend complex texts, pupils need to actively engage with what they are reading and use their existing subject knowledge. Reading strategies, such as activating prior knowledge, prediction and questioning, improve pupils' understanding of texts. Teachers introduce strategies through modelling and group work, before support is gradually removed to promote independence.

### Impact on provision and standards

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The introduction of disciplinary literacy as a fundamental practice has impacted positively on provision, especially curriculum design and teaching. Incorporating and prioritising disciplinary reading has enabled pupils to recognise, transfer and adapt a range of reading skills, from skimming and scanning, to making inferences, sequencing information, summarising, and comparing and contrasting information and ideas,

### Case study 2: Transition projects to share teaching strategies between the primary and secondary phases, including teaching reading

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### Context and background to the practice

Leaders found that not all staff had the knowledge and skillset to support the progress of those pupils whose reading had regressed significantly, including those who joined the school with a reading age of less than 6.

### **Description of activity/strategy**

In 2021/22, the school used the Accelerated Learning Programme grant to employ a primary school teacher from one of its cluster schools to teach in the secondary school and to increase the number of sessions secondary staff taught in the cluster primaries. Developing pupils' reading skills was a particular focus, specifically confidence, fluency and vocabulary acquisition. The primary specialist supported the lessons of the most vulnerable and negatively impacted Year 7 pupils. This allowed her to work with staff on planning interventions and improving their pedagogical skills while also supporting pupils directly.

### Impact on provision and standards

Secondary staff's knowledge and understanding of curriculum, assessment and teaching has increased to support planning for transition. They are better informed of the approaches needed to secure improvement in outcomes for vulnerable and lower attaining learners, including their reading skills. Primary staff are better able to challenge more able learners through their collaboration and professional learning with secondary teachers. Seventy-five per cent of learners in the target group improved their reading skills more than expected, measured by initial baseline testing and retesting at the end of the year. Pupils are more confident in reading aloud and their fluency has improved. They are better able to transfer key reading skills from one subject to another because of the consistent experience in their lessons.

# Welsh Baccalaureate

Year 10 Enterprise students have been working hard preparing for their Welsh Baccalaureate Summer Fair on 30th June.

They have faced the 'Dragons', been given £10 per group and are hoping to raise more money than ever for Hope House / Tŷ Gobaith on the day. Together with their 10 hours of Community volunteering and Global Challenges for the SCC they are becoming socially responsible citizens and we are very proud of their achievements so far

# **School Council**

The school council have been meeting every Tuesday Week B at lunchtime to discuss their priorities for this year, alongside any issues that the pupil body wish to raise. They have been working on increasing awareness of peer-on-peer abuse within the school community. So far, they have completed two pupil questionnaires, have created content to display around school to raise awareness of the school council as well as creating QR codes for pupils to raise any concerns, issues or ideas for the school council to discuss in their meetings.

The school council received training from Jane at The Spectrum Project on Gender stereotypes, healthy relationships, consent and peer-on-peer abuse. From this training they have planned sessions with Jane for years 7-10 through PSE sessions in June and July to raise awareness and understanding of healthy relationships and other VAWDASV topics.

In addition to this, they have looked at other issues our current youth face both in North Wales and across the county. As a result, they have arranged for school beat to deliver sessions on Alcohol and Cannabis this term, as well as Bryon and Hermen from Milk Influencers who will deliver sessions to years 8-10 regarding Drugs, Violence and Gang culture.

The school council are now working with Mrs Gould on behaviour, rewards, phones and uniform for the next academic year, as well as looking at their priorities for the next academic year ready for the next cohort of School Council.

We have been fortunate enough to have two visits from speakers from Milk Education.


Hermen Dange visited on Friday to use his personal experience to show the reality of gang culture from school, to prison, to completely rebuilding his life at 28. He talked about the causes and consequences of drug crime along with making better choices and mental health.

We also had Byron Highton with us who has dedicated his life to stopping knife crime in the UK, he educated the pupils on the cause, dangers and aftermath of knife crime including social media and being a bystander.

Our pupils were engaged throughout and some even took part in some demonstrations; following both sessions pupils commented on how they found the talks interesting, important and that although upsetting it had changed the way they think and how they might behave in certain situations.

Staff feedback was also positive, they shared how engaging the talks were and how well they presented tough topics that affect our pupils and the community. We can't wait for the next talk in the next academic year.

# **Humanities Department**

### Year 10 Geography Fieldwork

The Year 10 Geography students are looking forward to two days of fieldwork in July. The focus of the days will be to collect primary data with an emphasis on river and urban characteristics. We will be visiting the Afon Colwyn in Old Colwyn and Colwyn Bay town centre. The data collected will then be analysed and students will reach their own independent conclusions in preparation for their NEA which will be completed under examination conditions in December. We have been out and about on the school site, trying out the equipment that we'll be making use of in the fieldwork.



### Eco-Committee 2022-23

This year the Eco-Committee have achieved their Green Flag: 5th Platinum Award – something we are incredibly proud of! The Eco-Committee held their most recent meeting at the end of May. They reviewed their objectives for the year, discussed how they would like some more Geography lessons focusing specifically on the environment and how they could educate all pupils to have an understanding of their individual as well as collective impact on the environment. The Eco-Committee now plan to highlight the issue of litter within our school community and will start by running a poster campaign.

### WelshWise Quiz

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In February, Ysgol Bryn Elian was delighted to host the Geographical Association WelshWise Quiz for 2023. The WelshWise Quiz brings together pupils from various schools for face-to-face geographical fun and is designed to promote pupil interest in geography in Wales. Two teams from Years 8 and 9 in YBE competed and, although we did not win, our learners did us proud and were a credit to both themselves and the school.



# **Humanities Department**

### Humanities: Year 9 Play-Doh waterfalls

In a bid to encourage Year 9 pupils to successfully access extended answer GCSE questions, Miss Owen's Geography classes used Play-Doh to help them to explain how waterfalls form. Learners were given three colours which represented hard (resistant) rock, soft (less-resistant) rock and water. Some learners attempted 3D models while others opted for 2D models to annotate. The learners really enjoyed this hands on creative activity with a practical approach to learning.



### Humanities: Year 7 'water cycle in a bag'

Last term, Year 7 geographers learnt about weather, climate and climate change. As part of this learning experience they have created their own water cycles. Once created in a plastic bag using water, blue food colouring and pens, the bags have been attached to the window. The sun has then worked its magic causing evaporation and condensation to take place thus illustrating the movement of water through the system. Learners have observed their water cycles operate, reinforcing their classroom learning.




# **English Department**

In terms of the English department, we've had a fair bit going on since January.

After writing Winter Wonderland poetry - 16 learners from years 7 and 9 have had their work selected for publication. This poetry anthology by Young Writers is being published this month, which is very exciting!

The Carnegie Shadowing group have been making their way through the shortlisted and now the longlisted books, posting reviews on each novel on the Carnegie website. They've had a lovely time completing activities on each of the stories and have learned a lot about the creation of a character and have scrutinised each story in order to determine who should win the medal for writing. The Carnegie group have voted for their favourite novel, and this will contribute towards who will be awarded in the ceremony at the end of June.

Some of our Year 7 and Year 8 learners have had their mini stories published. The theme was 'numbers' and they had a maximum of 100 words to tell their tale.



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# **Maths Department**

### Year 12

Thank you very much to all the Year 12 learners that have been helping out in Mathematics lessons. The younger learners have appreciated the assistance and the Year 12 learners have been excellent role models.

### Year 11 Financial Mathematics and Additional Mathematics

Year 11 learners have had the opportunity to gain a Level 2 qualification in Financial Capability and Careers Development. Many learners have already completed and gained the qualification. A number of learners have also studied towards an Additional Mathematics qualification which bridges the gap between GCSE and A Level Mathematics.

### **Problem Solving Session**

A group Year 10 learners attended a problem-solving session. The problems were varied and challenging with the learners enjoying the collaboration and the creativity. They demonstrated perseverance and resilience to solve the problems.

### **Maths Careers Talks**

Sixty Year 10 learners engaged in the opportunity to find out about the diverse careers that involve and rely on Mathematics. Hosted at Bryn Elian, the learners completed activities as well as learning about the different careers.

### **Royal Institution Mathematics Masterclasses**

Two Year 9 learners had the opportunity to attend the Royal Institution Masterclasses at Bangor University. The sessions ran on a Saturday morning and covered a variety of Mathematics, extending the curriculum into new areas of Mathematics for them.

### **Mathematical Association Junior Mathematics Challenge**

A group of Year 7 and Year 8 learners have been working hard at lunchtime in preparation for entry into the Junior Maths Challenge, developing their Mathematical thinking and reasoning skills. They had excellent results, congratulations to them all. One learner is moving onto the next stage of the competition.

### **Mathematics Club**

Working with the Further Maths Support Programme Wales, the KS3 Maths club has gone from strength to strength. It is open to all KS3 students and over the course of the year learners have developed their logical reasoning and strategic competency skills, though playing mathematical games, as well as their wonder of Maths through Maths magic with numbers and shapes with disappearing faces.

# MFL Department prepare for trips

During activity week, The MFL department are running 2 trips. One trip will explore the stunning area of Normandy in Northern France and the other will journey to the capital city of Germany, Berlin.

The Normandy trip, run by French Teacher Mr S Davy has an exciting programme of French language, culture and history. They will travel by coach to Plymouth where they will make the rest of the journey by ferry. 50 Students will get to see the Bayeux Tapestry, visit Mont Saint-Michel and experience a 3D WWII immersive production. In Berlin, 40 students, will accompany Mr M Jones and fly from Manchester and stay in former East Germany. There, they will see famous landmarks such as the Reichstag Building, the Brandenburg Gate and the TV tower. The trip will be capped off with a meal at the Hard Rock Café on the final evening.

# **Performing Arts Department**

### **Hop in Harmony**

Thursday 23rd March saw the Performing Arts Department latest show 'Hop in Harmony' display the talents of the pupils here at school. A packed audience listened to a huge variety of performances ranging in style from classical to jazz, pop music and musical theatre, clapping and singing along (when they knew the words). There was a stunning performance on the harmonica from Leo Plant, followed by some lovely piano solos, a lively song and dance performance of 'Revolting Children' from 'Matilda' by the Variety Club. Not to be outdone, some year 7 & 8 pupils who attend Band Skills club gave us a rousing rock version of 'Seven Nation Army' contrasting with a lovely rendition of 'Castle on a Cloud' from Les Mis sung by Lucy Spindley. The evening began and ended with Denys Podcherniaiev (who came to us from the Ukraine in September) performing 'Brazil' on his classical guitar and 'Jazz Carpathian Mountains' on his violin.

### **Band Skills Club**

A large number of pupils in Year 7 – 10 are still attending band skills club and have now been put into 3 new bands and are currently learning to perform pop/rock songs. In September the new Year 7 pupils will also be encouraged to join the club, with the hope that in the future there will be enough bands to perform in a 'Bands' night here in school.

### **Recording Studio**

The Performing Arts Department has received funding to allow the purchase of professional sound recording equipment so that a recording studio can be created in the music room. Staff are currently learning how to use the equipment and hope that any performers who wish to record tracks, create their own albums or bands who would like to record will be able to use the facilities from September.

# **Science Department**

Following on from the fantastic GCSE and A level results last summer, the Science department has been working on developing practical skills which had become a challenge during the lockdowns. We have made good use of the new A level Science lab and 6th form laptops to facilitate practical work, research in lessons and private study within the Science department. We continue to look to purchase resources to facilitate practical work.

We are very lucky to have a rich and diverse site which lends itself to field work. Within the rich woodland habitat there are 200 year old trees and an array of animal and plant life. This site has enabled most year groups to experience some field work this year and this looks set to continue, especially whilst the weather is good.





We are currently developing our curriculum to enrich the experiences of learners in Science and hope they come to us ready to use their literacy, numeracy and digital skills to underpin and report on their scientific inquiries.

### Year 12 Gold Crest

Earlier this year, five year 12 pupils took on the challenge with the EESW to work alongside the world leading engineering company, JCB. Ianto Evans, Christopher Jones, Ffion Boardman, Elliot Dutton, and Joseph Elliott all worked towards developing an AR (augmented reality) system, which would enable JCB trainee employees to learn and develop engineering and manufacturing skills, without needing to be in the factory. At Venue Cymru's STEM Awards event, the team were awarded first place for the 'Best Innovation' category. They have also successfully achieved the coveted 'Gold Crest Award'.



The team at JCB are so impressed with the AR Project, they have invited the YBE pupils to their Wrexham offices to deliver a presentation to the owners of JCB.






# **Design & Technology**
