Moving on to next year, I'd like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of a few things for September. Getting things right from the beginning often avoids unnecessary conflict and difficulties, making the learning environment better for all.

Can I remind all parents and learners of the school uniform expectations, especially on PE Days – school PE top and black or navy bottoms, no grey allowed. (These can be found on the school website.)

Not all uniform that is available in uniform sections in shops is appropriate for our school. We have spare uniform and we will be asking learners to change if they come to school in the wrong uniform, including shoes and skirts that are not mid-thigh length. Leggings are not allowed as part of school uniform, neither are Converse

type shoes (unless all black), and shoes on non-PE days MUST be all black. In addition, if you have difficulty purchasing uniform, there is the School Essentials Grant which can be accessed to support, in certain circumstances, the purchase of uniform.

After consultation, our Mobile Phone Policy will not change. However, it will be enforced by all staff; there will be no warnings for those using phones in places where they are not allowed. They will be confiscated on sight. In addition, we will add a new alert to Satchel One where a learner will receive a O behaviour point to keep you informed. We value parent co-operation with this as the impact of 'free' and uncontrolled phone usage has a major impact on learning.

A note on attendance. Good attendance is classed as 95% or above. Anything lower than this, and learning and progress begins to be impacted. Please can you work with the school to ensure your children are in as much as possible and, where there are issues, we are more than willing to help and support you and your family. Furthermore, punctuality is also very important. Morning registration starts at 8:30am. All learners must be in their form room by then.

Finally, I'd like to extend a huge thank you to the Friends of Bryn Elian. They have supported the school over the past year, arranging events to raise money for initiatives in school which benefit our learners, your children. School Partnership

This year's trip to Paris was a massive success on many counts. Students taking part really enjoyed the experience of visiting most of the Parisian landmarks and trying out their language skills.



BTEC students have experience of running live sound for events as it is part of their course and found what Mike was saying fascinating, as they understood some of the challenges.

Kev commented on how enthusiastic our learners were and how impressed he was with their questioning, so much so that he (when he is able to) has offered to come back to perform for more pupils.



Medieval Knight

Over one hundred examples of Year 7 Medieval art, music and drama work was on display at the interactive exhibition 'Medieval Knight' which took place in studio one on Tuesday 18th June.

Tim Pugh Workshops

Art teacher Aimee Jones successfully secured a grant with the Arts Council of Wales to give Year 7 pupils the opportunity to meet and work with environmental artist Tim Pugh (an artist they have been studying as part of the New Curriculum for Wales.

Tim has delivered three full day workshops based on the effects of plastic pollution. The pupils have been making their own Top Trumps cards based on the ratings of found plastic toys that have been washed up on the beach.

Students have also been working collaboratively with Tim to create large art installations from found beach plastic.

Maddison Jones' Whale art work was short-listed by Tim Pugh, selected for her outstanding creativity and awareness of how plastic is destroying our oceans.





Year 10 Rugby

Forensics Day

Last week, our school embarked on an exciting and educational adventure with our very own "Forensic Days." Special thanks to Mr Parsons our resident forensics expert for helping to set up the day and for sharing his knowledge and experiences.




Chester Zoo
