

Year 7 AOLE - Science and Technology

Year 7 Textile learners have been learning about the word Biomimicry, what it means and how designers and engineers in industry use biomimicry to solve a design problem. Biomimicry is considered a blend of Art, DT and Science - innovation ideas inspired by nature.

Year 7 have looked at birds to inspire their fashion designs. Use of colour, pattern, feathers have been key elements.

Learners' Textile banner has been inspired by nature, leaf shapes, patterns and colour.

Year 8 have been inspired by a Mexican textile artist 'Victoria Villasana'. Victoria Villasana, stitches into black and white portraits and uses uncut thread.

Year 8 learn the process of building on skills from year 7 and have used a variety of stitches and their own chosen image to create their own inspired final piece.


Year 13 Tourism Event




The school council have been meeting every Tuesday Week B at lunchtime to discuss their priorities for this year, along side any issues that the pupil body wish to raise. They are working on increasing awareness of peer on peer abuse within school communities, as well as focusing on Healthy Eating, working closely with our school provider Shire Catering. So far they have created two pupil questionnaires to share in January, have been working on content to display around school to raise awareness of the school council and are working on developing a school newsletter to share key information regularly. QR codes have been developed and displayed around school for pupils to raise any concerns, issues or ideas for the school council to discuss in their meetings.

On Thursday 1st December, the school council met with a team from Public Health Wales to discuss a new campaign project to promote immunisations in North Wales amongst the teenage population. They were asked to give their views and opinions on immunisations, ideas for promoting and increasing up take as well as creating posters for the team to take back to their design team at PHW. The school council will be meeting with them again in the new year to see what PHW have created and give further feedback.

Spotlight on - Peer on Peer Abuse:

Whilst it can be incredibly rare, Peer on Peer abuse occurs when a young person is exploited, bulled and/or harmed by their peers who are the same or similar age. Peer-on-peer abuse or harm is any form of physical, sexual, emotional and financial abuse, and coercive control, exercised between children, and within children's relationships.

This can include but is not limited to:

- bullying, including cyberbullying, prejudice-based and discriminatory bullying
- physical abuse such as hitting, kicking, shaking, biting, hair pulling, or otherwise causing physical harm; this may include an online element which facilitates, threatens and/or encourages physical abuse
- harmful sexual behaviours or sexual harassment, such as sexual comments, remarks, jokes and online sexual harassment, which may be standalone or part of a broader pattern of abuse
- causing someone to engage in sexual activity without consent, consensual and non-consensual sharing of nude and semi-nude images and or videos.

Our approach to sexual violence and sexual harassment is part of the broader approach to safeguarding, which is transparent, clear and easy to understand for our staff, pupils and parents. Ysgol Bryn Elian has a clear set of values and standards underpinned by our behaviour policy and by a programme of evidence based content taught through our curriculum. Such content is age and development stage specific and tackles issues such as the following:

- Healthy relationships
- Respectful behaviour and consent
- Gender roles, stereotyping and equality
- Body confidence and self-esteem
- Prejudiced behaviour
- Addressing cultures of sexual harassment

Downplaying certain behaviours, for example dismissing sexual harassment as "just banter", "just having a laugh", "part of growing up" or "boys being boys"; or not recognising that emotional bullying can sometimes be more damaging than physical harm, can lead to a culture of unacceptable behaviours and an unsafe environment for children therefore any form of peer on peer abuse is taken very seriously at Bryn Elian.

If you have any concerns about peer on peer harm or abuse, please speak to a member of the safeguarding or pastoral team.



Learner Voice We Listen...

You asked to be involved in shaping the school's future...

Learner voice has been instrumental is the shaping of our new curriculum.

The school's new vision and values were drawn up after consultation with learner voice as well as parent, teacher and community voice

You asked if we could review the wearing of trainers and whether tailored shorts could be introduced as a Summer uniform...

All black trainers are now considered suitable footwear and black or grey knee length tailored shorts can be used from May through to July.

We built an outside catering pod so that there was another area to buy food. We also re-modelled the cafeteria
